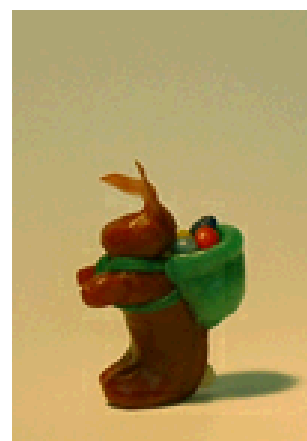




Visiting an Easter Bunny Family

TECHNIQUES



You need

- Strips of STOCKMAR Modelling Beeswax or Modelling Wax (40 x 100 mm) in the colours brown, red, white, green, yellow and blue
- A kitchen knife
- Sticking Wax
- Floral wire

shaping the ears directly out of the head; connect head and body with a piece of wire.

3 – Make a white ball for the tail and attach to the back using a tiny bit of Sticking Wax (Dia. 1 + 2).

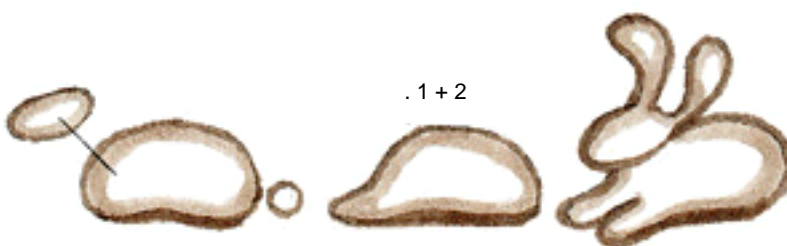
4–The rabbit with the front legs is a bit larger. Model the paws directly out of the body (Dia. 1 + 2). Proceed as described under 2 and 3.

6– Model the head, ears and tail as descri-

Rabbits in a lying position

1– Form an oval (about 3 cm diameter) from the brown Modelling Wax and firmly press one side onto a smooth surface or cut it evenly with the knife.

2– Model the rabbit's head from a 1.5 cm oval,

bed under 2 and 3.

The Pannier basket

7- For the carrying strap of the basket, form a roll from the green Modelling Wax, flatten with your finger, cut narrower with the knife if necessary and place around the front paws. For the pannier basket, shape a 2 x 3 mm rectangle, bend it round and close the bottom; attach to the rabbit's back and fill with coloured eggs (Dia. 4).

Coloured Egg

8- The coloured egg that the rabbit is holding between its front paws is made from leftover pieces of Modelling Wax that are kneaded together.

Basket and Nest

9- Make the red basket as described in the directions for "Modelling Basic Forms" (Dia. 4/"Small Vessels"). Fill

TIP

To attach small parts like the carrying belt of the pannier basket or to smooth over edges, it can be helpful to use a modelling stick or wooden skewer.

with white eggs. Proceed similarly for the nest.

Hen and chicks

10- The hen and chicks are modelled in one piece: shape the body from a ball of Modelling Wax, then model the head, beak and tail directly out of the body. The Hen gets a red comb.
